To that end, in reviewing each statement we will look for a diverse cross-section of participants from California Native Nations and Indigenous grassroots organizations, in particular aiming to achieve geographic diversity within California as well as diversity with respect to Tribal population and land base, federal and state recognition status, interest in traditional and renewable energy resources, and experience with environmental justice, energy justice, and impact investing.
